

NCLC entry provides scholars full scope of writing on EOS

The first full review of critical commentary on Oakes Smith is out this winter in the latest volume of Gale's *Nineteenth Century Literary Criticism*: 387 (2020).

This eighty-five page entry features an updated biographical introduction and review of Oakes Smith's major works, with details not available to Scherman (vol 239) or Belasco (vol 243) in their entries for Gale's *Dictionary of Literary Biography*.



Of course it is difficult for these publishers to include the latest scholarship in full text, but even the critical work included here will offer scholars a more capacious view. Included in full text are

- > Rufus Griswold's headnote on Oakes Smith's work and extensive selections from her work from his *Female Poets of America* (1849);
- > John S. Hart's entry on Oakes Smith for *The Female Prosewriters of America* (1852);
- > Caroline May's entry on Oakes Smith from The American Female Poets: With Biographical and Critical Notices (1853);

New resources for scholars...

Society Officers Hold Annual Meeting, Agree on Offering EOS Scholarship for 2021

With the COVID-canceled ALA conference last May delaying the first official meeting of the incorporated Elizabeth Oakes Smith Society, we had a very full agenda at our ZOOM meeting in early December. Issues discussed were revisions to the website, new forms for membership, and several possible conference panels—at ALA, SSAWW or our own virtual conference at a time convenient for scholars during the summer.

Most exciting, perhaps, was the one motion requiring expenditures, passed unanimously by the officers of the Society. Timing will depend on the re-opening of libraries and accommodations in and around Portland, but the officers agreed to inaugurate the Society's first scholarship this year, providing \$1500 for one annual recipient to study the life and work of EOS over a minimum of four days at the recipients' choice among archives in the area, at the Maine Historical Society library, the Maine Women Writers collection at the University of New England, and other locations and institutions in the area.

If conditions prevent arrangements for this year's recipient to complete work during the calendar year, there will be two recipients for 2022.

A detailed application for the Oakes Smith Research Scholarship will be circulated by March 1, with a deadline for applications May 1 and decisions made by May 30.

While Rebecca Jaroff has done the most work on EOS's career as a dramatist, even she may be surprised to read in the commentary of Rufus Griswold details about Oakes Smith's play *The Roman Tribute; or Attila the Hun* (1849). Along with Woodward's note from the 1950s, Griswold's extensive entry provides new clues to an under-documented moment in Oakes Smith's career directly proceeding her own emergence on to public stages as a Convention leader and lecturer.

Research and Teaching Notes

- At the American Academy of Religion conference for 2020 (virtual), Ashley Reed (Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University) delivered a paper in the session "Women Shaping Theology and Religion in the Nineteenth Century" entitled "The Fictional Medium: Spiritualism and Women's Religious Authority in Elizabeth Oakes Smith's Bertha and Lily."
- Timothy H. Scherman, Chair of English and Linguistics at Northeastern Illinois University, is offering an online seminar this spring entitled "ENGL 391: One Woman Writer," cross-listed with a graduate seminar on material culture and research as well as NEIU's English Institute, open to the broader community—perhaps the first such course delivered on the life and work of Elizabeth Oakes Smith.
- Carly Gielarowski, Independent Scholar, spent the summer as a paid research intern for the Oakes Smith Society, locating, annotating and uploading more than 30 previously uncatalogued Oakes Smith poems, stories and sketches to our website.
